Background:

The Neighborhood Place for Early Head Start, a division of the Early Learning Coalition of Miami-Dade and Monroe, Inc., provides Early Head Start services to 750 infant/toddlers and their families residing in Miami-Dade County. The Neighborhood Place for Early Head Start partners with approximately 28 private Miami-Dade child care providers who provide the educational standards to our target enrollment of 750 infants/toddlers. It is the intent of Early Head Start-Child Care Partnership Grants to increase the level of quality of private child care providers in their schools and playgrounds.

1. General Repairs/Improvements:

All work must be conducted by Florida licensed general contractors that are in good standing, who adhere to the Davis-Bacon Act and Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) regulations.

- a. Conduct assessment on each site to determine repair/improvement needs:
- b. Perform job on each site after approval including:
 - Painting
 - Carpentry includes, but is not limited to, installation/replacement/removal of walls, baseboards, doors, cabinets, ceiling replacement
 - Electrical installation of updated receptacles, electrical boards, etc.
 - Flooring installation and repairs
 - Plumbing
 - Air Conditioning
 - Building structures including roof

2. Playground Needs:

All work must be conducted by Certified Playground Safety Inspectors certified by the National Association of Park and Recreation Association.

- a. Evaluate each site and provide design plans showcasing appropriate equipment and play areas including proper ground covering and shade structures to accommodate children ages birth to 3 years old
- b. Installation of equipment must meet all Davis-Bacon Act and Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) regulations
- c. All work done is to be according to Miami-Dade County Building and zoning rules and regulations, as well as, the city in which each partner school is located.

Note: As per 45 CFR 1309.3, services should be conducted in the school owner's owned facilities.

Strategic Plan Priority Investment Area: Early Childhood Development: Child Care Quality Improvement.

- Strategic Plan Headline Community Result(s): Children attend quality child care; and children are ready for kindergarten.
- **Recommended Action:** Authorization for a procurement waiver from competitive solicitation for tiered payment differentials and contracted slot payments; and authorization to negotiate and execute a contract with The Early Learning Coalition of Miami-Dade/Monroe for up to \$12,000,000.00 for tiered payment differentials and contract slot payments to early learning programs that meet various quality-level thresholds, for a term of 12 months, commencing August 1, 2018 and ending July 31, 2019.
- **Budget Impact:** Funding in the amount of \$12,000,000.00 for this resolution is allocated for FY 2017-18 with a projected availability in FY 2018-19.

Description of Services: The Children's Trust will build on Florida's current strategic investments to improve the quality of early learning programs for children at greatest risk of school failure through the Early Learning Performance Funding Project (ELPFP). This funding seeks to better customize and address the financial challenges of child care providers in low income/high-need ZIP codes, resulting in higher quality programming for children. The Children's Trust established targeted investments and processes designed to address local challenges and needs. Funding for the achievement and maintenance of quality standards would be available to early learning providers through a payment differential and through contracted slot payments. The Early Learning (OEL) to administer school readiness payments, Gold Seal payments and administer the ELPFP in Miami-Dade County. This shift allows The Children's Trust to leverage state funding.

The child care payment differential and the value of the contracted slot will be established based on the level of quality, as measured by the Classroom Assessment and Scoring System (CLASS) tool, a research-based observational system to measure teacher-child interactions. Child care providers will have access to separately-funded quality improvement supports from the Early Learning Coalition, including professional development, accreditation supports, and on-site technical assistance and coaching.

Contracted slot payments address the early learning capacity issues in our community. Because Miami has a significant oversaturation of the childcare market and coupled with low payment rates for children receiving school readiness subsidies, providers are unable to meet and maintain high quality standards. The Children's Trust will offer guaranteed payment for slots in high quality programs, to serve children that are not otherwise served by the school readiness program. The Trust proposes to serve children that become ineligible for school readiness subsidy during the school year, families that have income up to 250% of the federal poverty rate, children on the school readiness waitlist or children and families referred from one of our funded programs.

To receive a payment differential on top of the current school readiness subsidy rate, eligible providers would be required to have a CLASS score that meets a minimum threshold of quality and must also provide infant and toddler care, a service in short supply that is critical to closing the achievement gap. The requirement to offer infant and toddler care is aimed at increasing access through reducing some of the financial disincentives for offering this more expensive care for our youngest children.

The proposed strategies will positively impact the quality of early learning in Miami-Dade County in several ways:

- 1) children at greatest risk of school failure in low income ZIP codes will have increased access to quality early learning experiences that prepare them for early grade success;
- 2) child care providers in high-poverty/high-need areas will have financial supports and incentives to increase quality;
- 3) the Early Learning Coalition of Miami-Dade will be able to provide payment differentials to improve the access to quality child care for families in high-need communities; and
- 4) The Trust will model how variances in identifying and addressing the financial challenges of providers can be used to improve quality, increase access for infants and toddlers, and positively impact the child care market.

Background: The Children's Trust has made significant investments to increase the quality of child care in Miami-Dade County for almost a decade through the Quality Counts program. These strategic investments have assisted many child care providers in achieving goals and accessing resources. With growing recognition of the importance of quality early learning experiences, particularly for children at-risk of school failure, there is now a larger body of research and a greater understanding of how best to target interventions, resources, and policy that can most directly support increased quality.

As the Trust continues to refine its approaches to child care provider supports, there is opportunity to refine strategic investments based on the current landscape, research proven strategies, as well as the current realities of the child care market. This is inclusive of leveraging Florida's current strategic investments to improve quality for children at greatest risk of school failure through the Early Learning Performance Funding Project (ELPFP).

Request for Procurement Waiver (requires approval of a 2/3 vote of board members present): This resolution is requesting a waiver of the procurement process and is seeking the authorization to negotiate and execute a contract with the ELC to administer tiered payment differentials and contracted slot payments to early learning providers for contract year 2018-19. The ELC was created after The Florida Partnership for School Readiness, section 411.01, Florida Statutes, was endorsed. The ELC was created to enact school readiness programs and administer federal, state and local funds allocated by the State Office of Early Learning (OEL) within the Agency for Workforce Innovation (AWI) for subsidized child care in Miami-Dade and Monroe Counties. As such, they are the sole entity responsible for administering all state and federal child care payments to early learning providers.
